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I. DESCRIPTION

This course is an introduction to research and the Turabian format. Topics will include the library catalog, narrowing a topic, database credentials and searching, formatting a paper in the Turabian style, and building citations. (Fee: \$25)

II. OBJECTIVES

General competencies to be achieved. The student should:

1. Recall information to assist with electronic research (Program Learning Objective 1) (Assessment A – Participate in class, Assessment B – Homework, Assessment C – Projects)
2. Retrieve search results using electronic databases (Program Learning Objectives 1 and 4) (Assessment A – Participate in class, Assessment C – Projects)
3. Show the steps to format a paper in Turabian format (Program Learning Objectives 1 and 4) (Assessment A – Participate in class, Assessment B – Homework, Assessment C – Projects, Assessment D – Quizzes, Assessment E – Final Exam)

Specific competencies to be achieved. The student should:

1. Acquire credentials to access electronic databases and the library catalog (Program Learning Objective 1) (Assessment B – Homework)

4. Model correct Turabian format for research papers (Program Learning Objectives 1 and 4) (Assessment A – Participate in class, Assessment B – Homework, Assessment E – Final Exam)
5. Given sources, compile a bibliography and footnotes according to Turabian (Program Learning Objectives 1 and 4) (Assessment B – Homework, Assessment C – Projects)
