I. DESCRIPTION

This course will focus on the general information regarding some of the physiological responses in the body and how these responses affect our behavior, interactions, etc. The Biblical worldview will also be examined in relation to the inner workings of the physical body. (**Prerequisite: SS223 General Psychology**)

This is a blended class, meaning that both campus and online students take this class together. Campus students attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. All interaction and assignments for campus and online students are done in the online classroom.

II. OBJECTIVES

A. General competencies to be achieved. The student will:

1. Know the basic terminology of the brain and its functions (PLO 4, 5, 6).
2. Know some of the basic ways the body works in relation to the brain (PLO 4, 5, 6).
3. Know the origins of physiological psychology (PLO 4, 5).
4. Explain the Biblical worldview of physiological psychology (PLO 1, 4, 5).
5. Be academically prepared for graduate level study (PLO 4, 5, 6).

B. Specific competencies to be achieved. The student will:

1. Know the different part of the brain and its function (PLO 4, 5, 6).
2. Identify the parts of the brain that are affected in neurological disorders (PLO 4, 5).
3. Learn how the brain works in relation to the body (PLO 4, 5).

4. Differentiate from the perspective of a secular humanistic worldview and a biblical worldview (PLO 1, 4, 5, 6).

III. REQUIREMENTS

A. Reading Assignments

Reading Journals: (two (2) *full* pages each) the student will give the main points of the chapters read and reaction/reflection on the reading. The student will also share his/her own thoughts or opinions about the subject of the material. The student will also share how this information might be used in his/her own life (or not), and why. The personal reflection section may be written in the first person. There will be a total of **seven (7) journals**. **Each journal is worth 25 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5; SC 1, 2, 3).

B. Written Assignments

Critical Thinking Canvas Discussion: (two-three (2-3) paragraphs minimum) the student will examine topics concerning physiology using other sources. Each student will respond to at least three classmates with a minimum of two-three paragraphs. There will be total of **seven (7) Canvas discussions**. **Each assignment will be worth 30 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5; SC 1, 2, 3, 4).

Key Term Assignment: Student will read, write down and submit the key terms that are relevant to the chapter they are reading. There will be **seven (7) key term assignments**. **Each assignment is worth 20 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5; SC 1, 2, 3).

Physiological Psychology Assignment: (one-two (1-2) page **maximum**) student will read vignette and observe which areas of the brain and the body that may be affected. Student will write out the assignment observing the important aspects of the physiology in the vignette. There will be **seven (7) Physiological Psychology assignments**. **Each assignment is worth 25 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5; SC 1, 2, 3).

C. Quizzes

There will be seven (7) quizzes in this course. The quizzes will cover information from the lectures from the previous week and will be taken on Canvas. They will consist of true/false multiple choice, and fill in the blank. There will be **five (5) quizzes**. **Each quiz is worth 10 points each** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5; SC 1, 2, 3).

D. Final Exam: The final exam will consists of 50 questions and will cover information presented and discussed in class. The exam questions will not be taken from the textbook unless the information was also covered in class. The final will include true/false, fill in the blank, and multiple choice (or guess). **The final exam is worth 100 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5; SC 1, 2, 3).

E. Class Participation and Behavior

Students are expected to maintain classroom decorum that includes respect for other students and the professor, prompt and excellent attendance, and an attitude that seeks to take full advantage of the educational opportunity. Students are to refrain from using cell phones and handheld devices during class. Playing games, browsing the internet, using email, instant messaging, or text messaging, etc. are considered unacceptable when class is in session. In addition, the student will be expected to contribute to class discussions in a positive manner which shows respect for the views of others. Failure to maintain this standard may result in a **full letter grade deduction from their overall grade.**
