I. DESCRIPTION

A study of the historical development of European music in the 18th century. The composers and great works of the Classical Era will be studied in their historical and social contexts. Emphasis will be placed on the development of the Classical style, and the three giants of the era: Haydn, Mozart, and Beethoven.

**This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.*

III. COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- D. **Score Reading.** The student is expected to study assigned scores.
- E. **Scholarly Writing.** The student is expected to write in a scholarly manner in one research project.
- F. **Identification.** The student will accurately describe musical excerpts heard in two listening quizzes.
- G. **Presentations.** The student will present on research project.
- H. **Reading Log.** The student will keep a log of summaries of the assigned readings.

IV. METHODS

- A. In-class methods will include lecture, discussion, quizzes, listening, and presentation.
- B. Out-of-class methods will include personal reading, listening, score study, research, completion of projects, and writing.
