Credit: 3 credit hours

I. DESCRIPTION

A course designed to provide an introduction to primary counseling theories, with special attention given to evaluating those theories on the basis of Scripture and according to a Christian worldview, especially in regards to understanding the nature of being human, observing how and why problems develop, and dealing with those problems in appropriate and effective ways. (Prerequisite: CO601 & CO603)

*This is a blended class, meaning that both campus and online students take this class together. Campus students attend the classes in person; online students attend the classes via the online classroom. All interaction and assignments for campus and online students are done in the online classroom. **Students wishing to apply for licensure in the state of Missouri should take the class on campus.***

Note: The State of Missouri requires that classes for licensure be taken synchronously (either in class or Livestream). If you are taking courses for Licensure for the state of Missouri you must be present either in class or Livestream for every class. Failure to do so may result in not meeting requirements for State Licensure in Missouri.

II. OBJECTIVES

- A. Understand the basics of various counseling theories commonly presented in a therapeutic environment and their philosophical, theological, and methodological assumptions and conclusions (PLO 2, 4).
- B. Be able to analyze counseling theories through a Christian worldviews and theological framework (PLO 1, 2, 4).
- C. Promote change in the client and personal wellness in the counselor by dealing with counseling issues in appropriate and effective ways (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).
- D. Incorporate biblical principles and values within the counseling setting (PLO, 1, 3, 4, 5).

V. REQUIREMENTS

A. Class Participation/Discussion (40%) (Objectives A, B, C, D, E)

Purpose: The purpose of the discussion boards is to provide the students with an opportunity to **collaborate** with the rest of the class in the **application, analysis, and evaluation** of select topics.

Each of the four designated weeks the student will be required to respond to a question on the discussion board. The posts must be substantive in nature and respond to the question considering the reading in the textbook and a theological application.

The initial post in response to each question must be posted to the discussion board by 11:59 p.m. CST on **Tuesday** of the week in which the question is asked. This will allow time for classmates to respond to the post. The student will also be expected to respond to at least two (2) other classmates' responses to the question in each discussion board. These interaction posts are due by 11:59 p.m. CST on **Wednesday**. You are also expected to answer any questions left on your post during the week. The first round of responses to questions left on your thread are due by 11:59 p.m. CST on **Thursday**. Discussions will continue until **Saturday** at 11:59 p.m. CST. Participation in each discussion post will be 100 points (10% of the final grade). Posts will be graded on professional courtesy, humility, critical thinking, understanding of common grace and the authority of Scripture.

B. Reading Assignments (10%) (Objectives, A, B, C, D, E)

Recommended textbooks do not **require** reading but can prove helpful for writing assignments. The subject matter of *Psychology and Christianity: Five Views* will be presented in class.

C. Written Assignments (50%) (Objectives A, B, C, D, E)

Plagiarism is defined as copying any part of a book or paper without identifying the author. This also includes taking another person's ideas and presenting them as your own.

All class papers must follow APA format 7th edition.

Write a 35-page summary paper for the following treatment systems presented in Theories of Counseling and Psychotherapies. Include an introduction and conclusion page. Offer insight where appropriate that evaluates these systems based on a Christian perspective presented in *Modern Psychotherapies: A Comprehensive Christian Appraisal*. It is recommended that the student dedicated 6-7 pages for each of the following five sections. **Due ##### (80%).**

1. Treatment Systems Emphasizing Background (2-6)
2. Treatment Systems Emphasizing Emotions and Sensations (7-11)
3. Treatment Systems Emphasizing Thoughts (12-14)
4. Treatment Systems Emphasizing Actions (15-17)
5. Other Treatment Approaches (18-19)

Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources.
