I. DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to evaluate and instruct a student with a view to improving his performance in the pulpit. Class lectures will be limited. The student will preach several types of sermons. Requires the preparation of preaching manuscripts from the original languages. (Men only) (Prerequisite: PS631 or equivalent) [ILO- #1, 2, 3, 4, & 5]

II. OBJECTIVES

A. General competencies to be achieved.

1. Demonstrate maturing skills in the preparation and presentation of expository sermons. (PLO- #1, 2, & 4) (A- A)
2. Prepare and present expository sermons for the various ministry seasons and settings of the local church ministry. (PLO- #1 & 2) (A- A, B, C, D)
3. Affirm his God-given preaching style. (PLO- #1 & 4) (A- B & D)

Our Mission: "...to prepare Christians to live and serve in the church and in the world according to the Biblical worldview."

B. Specific competencies to be achieved.

1. Prepare and preach a variety of expository sermons used in a local church setting. (PLO- #1, 2, & 3) (A- A & B)
2. Evaluate preaching effectiveness and context today. (PLO- #2, 3, & 4) (A- A & C)
3. Develop a personal preaching plan. (PLO- #1 & 4) (A- A & D)

III. REQUIREMENTS

***Note:** Specific instructions for each assignment are posted in Canvas.

A. Read textbooks.

1. Read the **one (1)** textbook in its entirety by the assigned due date. **Note:** At least **two** of the sermons preached for this course must employ the methodology described in this text.
2. Read an additional volume of at least **200 pages** related to preaching and on the due date, present an annotated bibliography of the materials read and the number of pages from each source.

B. Preach Sermons.

1. **Prepare 5 original** (i.e., never before preached and not adapted from any other source), **expository sermon outlines** of the following types of sermons. (**Note:** The specific texts and topics must be approved by the instructor before beginning sermon preparation.)
 - Sermon #1:** Doctrinal (e.g., attribute of God, nature of Christ's Person, work of the Holy Spirit, security of the believer, aspects of sanctification, etc.)
 - Sermon #2:** Seasonal – Easter (i.e., Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Sunrise, Easter, Ascension)
 - Sermon #3:** Practical Christian Living (e.g., marriage, discipleship, parenting, temptation, failure, etc.)
 - Sermon #4:** Evangelistic (i.e., a sermon spoken to the unbeliever with invitation to respond)
 - Sermon #5:** Leadership (e.g., ministry mission, vision, strategy, leadership, etc.)
2. **Prepare 2 additional expository sermon outlines** (i.e., these will not be preached in class) of the following types of sermons.
 - a. **Sermon #6:** Special (Wedding).
 - b. **Sermon #7:** Special (Funeral).

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3. **Preach the 5 sermons** in "1" above, **then present to the instructor** the following:
 - a. The complete sermon **outline** which includes the following:
 - (1) a full statement of the Sermon Idea,
 - (2) a full statement of the sermon's Purpose/anticipated Life Change,
 - (3) main points written as full sentences, and
 - (4) illustrations identified as to their purpose and "level."
 - b. **Note:** While a sermon may have many illustrations, at least **two (2)** the two illustrations submitted **must be** "Level 3, 2, or 1" illustrations (categories as explained in PS631).
 - c. **Note:** At least **two (2)** of these sermons must employ the use of visual media (e.g., video clip no longer than 3 min, physical object, PowerPoint).
 - d. **Note:** All "Blended" (and some in-class) students must (may have to) make video recordings of all (some) sermons, upload the video recording to a location where the instructor can view them (e.g., Youtube, GoogleDocs, etc. – Note: most video files are too large to upload to Canvas or email to the instructor; however, students have at times been able to upload mp4 files to Canvas and email them).

C. Interview Preaching Pastors and Congregation Members.

1. Interview the following individuals concerning preachers and preaching.
 - a) **1** Preaching Pastor (i.e., a pastor who has had regular preaching responsibility of at least 5 years)
 - b) **3** Church Attenders (i.e., people who have heard many sermons): 1 Youth (High School); 2-Adults (1 male, 1 female).
2. Following the interviews, submit a **3-page** paper indicating the following:
 - a) A summary of the significant observations gleaned from these interviews.
 - b) Discoveries made which the student wants to make sure he considers as he conducts his preaching ministry.

***Note:** While the quotation of pertinent comments is often appropriate to illustrate a point, this paper must not be a mere "word-for-word" transcript of the interviews; rather, this paper is to be a presentation of the student's analysis and conclusions from the interviews as a whole.

D. Write a Preaching Plan.

1. Submit a **one (1)** year preaching/sermon plan (i.e., 12 months of sermon themes and special/seasonal sermons). Guidelines for this plan will be given in class.
2. The purpose of this assignment is to demonstrate a basic understanding of the preaching variety necessitated in the normal pulpit ministry of a local church.

E. Write a statement of a philosophy of preaching.

1. Write a 2-page paper stating your personal philosophy of preaching.

IV. METHODS

A. Presentation:

1. **In-class methods:** lecture, discussion, presentation, and evaluation.

***About Class Attendance:** Research consistently demonstrates that class attendance and active participation correlate to higher performance on course assessments.

***About Classroom Use of Media:**

-**Computing devices** are permitted during the lecture and class discussion sessions for the sole purpose of taking notes. Use of these devices to access the Internet, make telephone calls or video calls, text messaging, updating social network services, etc. is not allowed, let alone very distracting to other students.

-**Cellphones / smartphones** may only be used in an emergency, and in those situations the student may take the call but must leave the room and not return until the next break out of courtesy to fellow classmates.

***About Note Taking:** Students are expected to take notes during each class. Significant peer reviewed studies continue to demonstrate that notes taken by hand are understood better and remembered longer than those taken with a computer. Computer use which is a distraction to others (i.e., noise, blocking the screen, displaying non-class related material, etc.) is not allowed.

2. **Out-of-class methods:** observation, evaluation, and sermon preparation.

***About written assignments:** Unless directed otherwise, all written assignments must follow the Turabian style according to *A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, 8th edition and the Calvary Style Guide, 2019 update.

B. Grading:

***About Late Assignments:** Assignments turned in late will be lowered **5% each class day** it is late.

***About Plagiarism:** Plagiarism is defined as copying any part of a book or paper without identifying that source. This also includes taking another person's ideas and presenting them as your own without identifying the source. Any assignment that includes plagiarism will receive a **zero (0) grade**.

***About course grade:** See the grading scale in the university catalog for specific grading scale that will be used for final course grade.

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1. General grading criteria:

- A = completed assignment well beyond assignment criteria
- B = completed assignment as specified and very well done
- C = completed assignment with average work

- e. Interviews & Summary (4 @ 5 ea & 1 @ 20) . = 40
- f. Preaching Plan (1 @ 40) . . . = 40
- g. Philosophy of Preaching (1 @ 50) . . . = 50

V. MATERIALS

A. Textbooks.

1. The Bible: NASBU, ESV, or NET.

-The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.
