Earlier in the week of graduation events Pastor Greg Washington, (continued on next page)

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

Conference on Global Engagement

The Conference on Global Engagement took place January 23-27, 2023. This year's theme was Engaging the Church in Local Missions, inspired by Acts 13:1-4 and its call for the church to raise up and send out missionaries. Calvary students had the opportunity to hear from a variety of chapel speakers, including Dr. Josh Paxton, Dr. Henry Vosburgh, Shawn Haynie, Dwight Hostetler, and John McGee.

Pastors, church leaders, and mission reps from over twenty-five different organizations attended, with many delivering seminars to students throughout the week. The conference also included a special track for local churches looking to improve their missions outreach and involvement. A particularly powerful seminar included "Strategies for Engaging Unreached People Groups in North America" by Dr. Mike Urton (Director of Immigrant Missions for EFCA), which featured a guest speaker from People Teams who

shared his experience spreading the gospel to unreached people groups within the Kansas City area. Following the conference, church leaders expressed gratitude for being included in this year's conference and gaining insight into the topics that were discussed.

Student responses were also positive, with some students connecting with mission reps Corrie (CBC06, CTS08) and Bethamy (CBS06, CTS08) Anderson to go on a mission trip to Mexico. Next year's Conference on Global Engagement will continue with a similar themeexpanding the reach of the event to include the public and even more local church leaders. The current date for COGE 2024 is January 22-24, with public registration opening toward the end of October 2023.

On February 5-7, 2023, Calvary hosted its very first Business Leadership Roundtable event focused on how local business and ministry leaders can strategically retain top talent within their organizations. Guest speakers included Kevin Holman (District Manager of Chick-fil-A), Dr. Germaine Washington (Program Chair of the Business Administration Department and Dean of Graduate Students at Calvary), and Andrew Hawkins (graduating senior from Calvary's Ministry Studies department).

Speakers gave presentations on topics including employee engagement, coaching, and human capital analytics. After individual presentations, a panel discussion gave attendees the opportunity to respond to the topics previously addressed.

Many who attended Calvary's 2023 Business Leadership Roundtable expressed appreciation for the relevance of the topics discussed within today's business climate. Attendees also suggested the Business Department host future annual conferences to educate and equip leaders of business and ministry organizations.

Part 1: The Shift

"In the flaring parks, in the taverns, in the hushed academies, your murmur will applaud the wisdom of a thousand quacks. For theirs is the kingdom." ¹

This question is one that we must answer, especially in a country where our educational system has historically been based on the beliefs of Protestantism. Why is Calvary University needed when for centuries Christian colleges and universities have played a major role in both Western intellectual history and the history of the church?

Many of the most well-known institutes of higher education

in America began as training grounds for pastors. Harvard, Yale, Princeton, and many others affirmed the usefulness of a liberal arts curriculum as preparation for service to both church and society. Christian scholars emphasized an empirical approach both to science and to the study of language and literature. In America the academy was responsible not merely for the accumulation of knowledge, but also

the moral and spiritual formation of the students. The liberal arts were useful because they were founded on the truth of the God of creation.

Calvary University is founded on the historic principle of preparing students for service in the church and in the world. It is likewise based on the idea that students should not merely seek to grow in their knowledge, but also grow in their ability to apply moral and spiritual truths to their lives. This being the case, with all the other universities that have the same founding principle, why is Calvary still needed today?

The answer is one that we can all see with our own eyes. Harvard, Yale, Princeton, etc., no longer cling to their historical purpose. In the last half of the nineteenth century, higher education began to move away from its founding principles. The accepted aim of higher education—disciplining the mind and building the character of students through a rigorous liberal arts curriculum and strict adherence to religious dogmacame under scrutiny. The appetite for freedom and autonomous spirit of the Enlightenment gave rise to those who labored to transform higher education. No longer was it acceptable to pursue the twin aims of accumulating knowledge and forming character, instead they desired to create a religiously neutral civilization.



Calvary University is committed to providing appropriate educational curricula and a climate that fosters the development of intellectual and spiritual maturity, leadership potential, servanthood, and a sense of mission.

In order to achieve this, they took aim at dismantling what they perceived to be the intellectual stronghold of narrow minded and elitist Christians. To decrease the presence of Christians in the church, academy, and civil society, they attacked the source: Christian higher education. They did this by using the three-pronged approach of Utility, Research, and Science.

These three weapons are still trained on institutions of Christian

higher education today. In the next several editions of Calvary Today, I will explore this triad of issues and how, despite them, Calvary University is still standing firmly on the relevance of the Word of God to everyday life.

- John 6:9 (NASB 95)

The people followed for a long distance. There were no markets around. Some say the crowd was more than 12,000.

Christ asks the disciples, "Where are we to buy bread?" knowing the answer.

Five barley loaves and two fish. A peasant meal for maybe two people. This is all they could come up with.

Yet, when all had eaten, twelve

baskets full of food remained uneaten. How? The mind asks and marvels.

You may have faced a similar situation at some point in your life, either personally or professionally. Many are the stories of provision that only can be understood as coming from Jehovah-Jireh.

Calvary faces a similar situation. We have five loaves and two fish and a need that seems like it is a meal for 12,000. We've been here before, and God has graciously provided for us each time.

Your testimony may be similar, and, in your mind, you can replay the details of need and supply.

Today, through a generous friend, God has supplied a \$230,000 challenge match. The need is \$750,000 by the end of June. Already God is supplying; 46% of the match has been received as of June 8th.

Do you have a loaf or fish that could be shared?

A walk of faith in Christ challenges us to trust him in all ways. Some days are more challenging than others. We trust him for provision.

We can each imagine the thoughts in the mind of the disciples — "This is impossible. Send them away."

And yet, even though his closest followers could not see the provision to come, He used them to provide.

Today, will you let God use your loaf or fish to supply this need? ■

Martha Olango is this year's Alumni Association Award recipient due to her outstanding ministry impact Child Evangelism Fellowship (CEF) in East and Central Africa.

Martha's ministry journey took flight when God called her to start working for CEF. She began a job within Mombasa, Kenya, and then moved to Nairobi in 1999 to later work as an education director in 2000. When she felt the need to earn a degree in biblical education, Martha attended Calvary University. prepared to lead with confidence, and ready to serve with integrity." After graduation, Martha moved back to Kenya where she worked for a short time as an assistant to CEF's Regional Education Director and later took on the position full-time in 2010.

In her current role as Regional Education Director for East and Central Africa, Martha has played a wildly influential role in teaching children, training teachers, and developing instructors and leaders for CEF. This work often requires that she go into very dangerous areas. Martha has made a great impact on is CEF's Christian Youth in Action program (CYIA), where she has faithfully trained teenagers to reach other children with the gospel. This training program began in Kenya but has now been developed in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Uganda, Tanzania, Ethiopia, South Sudan, and Burundi. Before Covid, nearly five hundred teens were trained each year. Within her local church, Martha has served in children's ministry while also

organizing a ministry to help meet the needs of single, young women in the church, known as EPIC. She has also extended great love and care for those in her local community, helping support several disadvantaged young people and being a light of Christ to those in her neighborhood.

Eidene Anderson, a friend of Martha and former missionary "Martha's ministry has stated: reached thousands of people with the gospel. She has impacted people personally as well as trained godly leaders who are maturing in their faith so that they too can share the gospel." Whether it is her impact on CYIA or reaching out to people within her community, Martha is known by those around her as a faithful servant who is continually studying, training others in ministry, and displaying courage in her faith.

In gratitude for her years of ministry and service to God, Calvary is beyond honored to present Martha with this year's Alumni Association Award.
