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DESCRIPTION

A study of the earthly life of Christ as revealed in the four Gospels. Special emphasis is placed on establishing a harmony of the Gospels, especially regarding the chronology of events, Jesus' message and His miracles. (Prerequisite: BI115)

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

OBJECTIVES

As a result of taking this course the student will:

1. Write a broad chronological outline of the life of Christ (PLO 1) (A 1-4)
2. Identify on a map the key places Jesus visited in his ministry (PLO 1) (A 1-4)
3. State biblical arguments defending the virgin birth of Christ, his sinless life, his miracles, his substitutionary death on the cross and his bodily resurrection from the dead (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A 1-4)
4. Explain the significance of various events in the life of Christ (the baptism of Jesus, the temptation of Jesus, the transfiguration of Jesus) (PLO 1, 2, 4, 5) (A1-4)
5. Interpret the parables and teachings of Christ in their historic context (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A1-4)
6. Become a committed disciple of Jesus by obeying the commands of Christ (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A1-4)

TEXTBOOKS

1. The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible

based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB), English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases and thought for thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.

1. Assignment #1: Weekly quiz over the material covered in classroom lectures (200 points)
2. Assignment #2: Weekly research questions about the Life of Christ (300 points)
3. Assignment #3: Research Paper (200 points). Ten pages following Turabian format.
4. Assignment #4: Read through the textbooks by Pentecost and interact with the reading through the research questions in Assignment #2 (200 points)
5. Assignment #5: Create a map of at least 50 key locations from the Life of Christ (100 points); Note: The 50 locations will be identified in the lectures and should be added to Google Maps (explained in first class period; alternatives available if necessary).
