I. DESCRIPTION OF THE COURSE

This course is the continuation of BL622 and continues an inductive study of New Testament Greek. The student is enabled to build necessary skills in the interpretation of the epistolary and narrative genres of the New Testament with a view toward personal and ministry application. (Prerequisite BL622)

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person. Online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

II. COURSE OBJECTIVES

A. The Aim of New Testament Greek Studies

The purpose of New Testament Greek Studies is to familiarize you with the language and text of the Greek NT; to equip you with a detailed knowledge of the basic elements of New Testament Greek grammar as the necessary foundation for subsequent study in syntax and exegesis; to equip you to do accurate exegetical work in the Greek NT so that you can expound it accurately and apply it effectively in your Christian ministry.

B. The Purpose of this Course

In this course you will become increasingly familiar with the language and grammar of the Greek NT. A foundation will be laid for exegetical study in succeeding semesters and later ministry with a view to communicating the word of God with clarity and accuracy.

C. Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Expanded knowledge of Greek grammar, syntax, and textual criticism
- 2. Greater familiarity with the Greek New Testament through extensive reading
- 3. Expanded Greek vocabulary
- 4. Increased confidence in handling the text of the Greek New Testament
- 5. Continued development in the use of the Greek New Testament in teaching and ministry

Our Mission: "To prepare Christians to live and serve in the church and in the world according to the biblical worldview"

The student will:

- 1. Identify and explain the primary uses of cases, moods, tenses, and clause structures in the New Testament. (PLO 1-4) (A 2, 4)
- 2. Sight translate selected sections of the New Testament. (PLO 1-4) (A 2-4)
- 3. Gain proficiency in textual criticism, word studies, and diagramming. (PLO 1-4) (A 1-6)
- 4. Write an exegetical paper that exhibits a thorough understanding of Greek grammar and syntax, as well as an understanding of the meaning of the text. (PLO 1-4) (A 3, 5-6)

III. TEXTBOOKS

A. Bible

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard Bible (NASB), English Standard Version (ESV), New King James Version (NKJV), or King James Version (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.

IV. REQUIREMENTS OF THE COURSE

A. Reading and Translation

- 1. Each student is required to read Fee's *Handbook* and by the end of the semester and acknowledge the reading in Canvas.
- 2. Each student will read the assigned chapter of *Going Deeper* each week and post questions and discussion in Canvas.
- 3. Each student will read through Ephesians in the Greek New Testament at least twice and read the *Exegetical Guide* at least the first time. You will make your own complete translation and parse all verbs to be ready for in-class discussion. You may use any other resources you have to assist in your reading and translation. Additionally, you should read the passage for your exegetical paper at least once per week to be thoroughly familiar with it.

B. Class Participation

Each student is expected to be in every class and to participate, which includes having translated the assigned text, parsed all the verbs, and noted any significant grammatical features in the text. Students will be expected to read from their translation in class and answer questions related to the grammar and syntax of the passage.

C. Exegetical Paper

- 1. Each student will write a 12–15 page exegetical paper on a passage from the book of Ephesians. The details of the paper are explained in the class lectures and handouts. The passage must be selected and approved by the professor by the beginning of the third class.
- 2. During the final class, each student will present a short 10-15 minute teaching based on their exegetical paper.
