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I. DESCRIPTION

A study of methods, information, materials, and techniques to prepare the music teacher for teaching elementary music. Special emphasis is given to understanding the needs of the student and providing methods for meeting those needs in the elementary music classroom. Includes information on teaching early childhood music. (Fee: \$30)

* This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

II. OBJECTIVES

- A. General competencies to be achieved. The student will:
 - 1. Play the melody of an elementary level song on (1) the recorder, and (2) on the piano OR resonator bells with pitch and rhythmic accuracy. Play the accompaniment of a song on guitar, autoharp, or keyboard.

- B. Specific competencies to be achieved. The student will:
 - Plan (in writing according to specified format), organize, teach, and evaluate segment lessons based on one musical concept and including at least one song. Song and activities selected should demonstrate awareness of appropriate materials for children at level specified and should be musically accurate.

 - 2. Become familiar with a variety of texts and methods in elementary music education by evaluating representative texts and preparing note cards of music activities for resource file purposes.

III. REQUIREMENTS

- A. **Two written exams** to be taken on scheduled days---no make-ups except in the case of student's illness or serious emergency.
- B. **Music Skills exam** three components.
 - (1) play three songs on a melody instrument (piano or bells)
 - (2) play two songs on the recorder
 - (3) accompany two songs on autoharp or guitar.
- C. **Two Music Concept lessons** 10 minutes in length. Written lesson plan for the lesson (must be typed). Each lesson must use at least one song and must use the prescribed format for written lesson plans. Each student will complete an evaluation/feedback comment sheet for each person.
- D. Design and implement a music activity to be presented at an "Experiencing Music" event.

A. In-class teaching methods will include lectures, discussion, and student teaching activities.
