I. DESCRIPTION

This course informs the student of basic information and knowledge in the abnormalities of human behavior. Students will also observe the Biblical worldview of Abnormal Psychology and some of the research and strategies that are used to address these abnormalities in human behavior.

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for inperson attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

II. OBJECTIVES

A. General competencies to be achieved. The student will:

- 1. Recognize the different types of abnormalities thoughts, attitudes, and behaviors (PLO 4, 5).
- 2. Identify key words that are associated with the abnormal behavior (PLO 4, 5).
- 3. Distinguish the differences of the different abnormalities in human beings (PLO 4, 5).
- 4. Explain abnormal behavior from a Biblical worldview (PLO 1, 4, 5).
- 5. Prepare students for graduate level study (PLO 6).

B. Specific competencies to be achieved. The student will:

1. Learn the different types of abnormal behavior (PLO 4, 5).

- 2. Learn the differences between symptoms and criteria (PLO 4, 5).
- 3. Learn the different criteria for abnormal behavior (PLO 4, 5).
- 4. Learn the difference between human abnormalities and demonic possession (PLO 1, 4, 5).
- 5. Differentiate abnormal psychology from Secular Humanistic philosophy from the Biblical worldview (PLO 1, 4, 5).

III. REQUIREMENTS

A. Reading Assignments

Reading Journals: (two full pages each) the student will give the main points of the chapters read and reaction/reflection of the reading. The student will also share his/her own thoughts or opinions about the subject of the material. The student will also share how this information might be used in his/her own life (or not) and why. The personal reflection section may be written in the first person. There will be a total of **seven** (7) journals. **Each journal will be worth 25 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2, 3, 4).

B. Written Assignments

Abnormal Psychology Class Discussion: Note: You <u>must</u> have a webcam in order to complete this assignment. The student will examine Scripture each week that will be given by the instructor. You will post a 5–10-minute video on a topic of the lifespan each week that will be given by the instructor, which they must comment on and offer insight on. Each student will post a 3–5-minute reply video to at least two of their classmates. There will be a total of seven (7) Canvas discussions. **Each will be worth 30 points** (GC 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2).

Key Term Assignment: The student will read, write down and submit the key terms that are relevant to the chapter they are reading. There will be **seven** (7) key term assignments. **Each assignment will be worth 20 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

Abnormal Psychology Assignment: (one page maximum): The student will read a vignette and identify the abnormal behavior that the one is exhibiting. They will bring their analysis in the following week and discuss the assignment. There will be a total of **seven** (7) assignments, and **each assignment will be worth 20 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

C. Quizzes: The quizzes will cover information from the lectures from the previous week and will be taken on CANVAS. They will consist of true/false multiple choice. There will be six (6) quizzes. **Each quiz is worth 15 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

D. Final Exam: The final exam will consist of 50 questions and will cover information presented and discussed in class. The exam questions will not be taken from the textbook unless the information was also covered in class. The final will include true/false, fill in the blank and multiple choice. **This final exam will be worth 100 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

E. Class Participation and Behavior

Students are expected to maintain classroom decorum that includes respect for other students and the professor, prompt and excellent attendance, and an attitude that seeks to take full advantage of the educational opportunity. Students are to refrain from using cell phones and handheld devices during class. Playing games, browsing the internet, using email, instant messaging, or text messaging etc., are considered unacceptable when class is in session. In addition, the student will be expected to contribute to class discussions in a positive manner which shows respect for the views of others. Failure to maintain this standard may result in a **full letter grade deduction from their overall grade**.

V. MATERIALS

A. Bible

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB), English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.

VI. CLASS POLICIES

Attendance

0-10 percent of AI*	No points deducted from your paper/project.	
11-20 percent of AI*	A third of your overall points are deducted from your paper/project.	
21-30 percent of AI*	75% of your overall points will be deducted from your paper/project.	
30+ Percent of AI	You will receive no points for the paper/project.	

^{*}Keep in mind this deduction is *added* to the points that you would lose due to other things (Improper writing style, grammar, etc.).

Writing Style

All class papers must follow the APA style according to the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association*, 7th edition. You can find APA resources under the *Getting Started Checklist* located in the *Introduction to Biblical Counseling* Course on Canvas.
