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DESCRIPTION

An introduction to the biblical principles of evangelism and spiritual life from a New Testament framework. Emphasis is on the practical methods of witnessing, discipleship, spiritual growth which includes our position in Christ by the Holy Spirit, and grace.

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments, and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

OBJECTIVES

A. General competencies to be achieved. The student will:

1. Describe what it means to be a Christian and the nature of the Christian's spiritual life. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10)

4. Articulate the Gospel message and confidently share it with others through actions and words. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4) (A 3, 4, 5, 9)

B. Specific competencies to be achieved. The student will:

1. Articulate a biblical understanding of the Christian spiritual life and how it is developed and maintained. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4) (A 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10) 2. Define and practice selected spiritual disciplines. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4) (A 8, 9, 10)

3. Write a personal testimony and Gospel presentations and share them with others. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4) (A 4, 5, 7, 10)

4. Describe spiritual warfare and God's means for victory in it. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A 1, 2, 6, 9)

5. Evaluate one's spiritual life and articulate a personal spiritual growth plan. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10)

Class Format

This course will follow a unique format of blending both classroom instruction and small group discussion. More details will be provided in class or in Canvas.

Assignments

1. Study Questions (13 sets worth 10 points each) 130 points

In Canvas the student will find 13 sets of study questions; questions are to be answered prior to the class meeting. Late study questions will be docked according to the late assignment policy listed below. Completing the study questions is an important part of participating in group discussion.

2. Discussion Response (13 x 10 points each) 130 points

As the class is separated into smaller groups, to maintain the cohesion of the entire class and involvement of online students, students will give one personal application from their small group time as a practical lesson learned in a discussion forum in Canvas. You must post your own reply before you can see others and it will be graded. Each response is worth 10 points. Students must also comment on the response of another student to receive Full Credit.

3. Testimony (Personal, 20 points); (Evangelistic, 80 points)

The student is to write two versions of their testimony. Instructions will be given in class. The first version is to be between 3-5 pages and is a personal version of their testimony as they might tell a believing friend. The second version is to be less than 2 pages and is to be a version for use in evangelistic situations. Students will share their testimonies in their groups. (Non-research Turabian format)

4. The 7 Principles of an Evangelistic Life (75 points)

The student will read the above book and write a review according to instructions provided in Canvas.

5. MIDTERM (100 points)

Students will take a "take-home" Midterm in Canvas.

- 6. Respectable Sins: Confronting the Sins We Tolerate (75 points) The student will read the above book and write a review according to instructions provided in Canvas.
- **7.** *Gifted: Understanding the Holy Spirit and Unwrapping Spiritual Gifts* (75 points)

The student will read the above book and write a review according to instructions provided in Canvas.

8. Prayer/Devotional Journal (125 points)

- **a.** Keep a prayer journal for the 16 weeks of the course, making entries for at least five days of each week for spending 20 minutes of each day in prayer and Bible reading.
- **b.** During the course of the class students will engage in outreach according to instructions provided in class and in Canvas. Students are required to document their encounters in their Prayer/Devotional Journal.

c. A summary of the journal will be turned in at the end of class. See CANVAS for more information.

9. Final Paper (100 points)

- **a.** Students will write a final paper according to instructions provided in class and in Canvas.
- **b.** The paper will be 5 pages (minimum, not including title page; Research paper Turabian format)

10. Final (100 points)

Students will take a "take-home" Final in Canvas.

METHODS

- **A. In-class methods:** listening to lectures, participating in group discussions.
- **B. Out-of-class methods:** reading, writing, research, participating in Canvas, and studying for tests.

- **C.** The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.
- **D.** All class papers must follow the Turabian style according to *A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, 8th edition. Unless otherwise indicated book reports and study questions may be in non-research format, interviews and other research papers should be in research paper format. A copy of the Turabian Style Guide is available on the Clark Academic Center page of Calvary's website.

- **E. Late Assignments**: Assignments will be penalized according to the professor's late policy as explained in Canvas.
- **F. Plagiarism**: Plagiarism is defined as copying any content without identifying the source. This also includes taking another person's or AI entity's ideas or constructs and presenting them as your own. The use of AI generated content in student work is prohibited (even if cited) as it does not represent original work created by the student and is an unreliable aggregate of ideas from other sources. Plagiarism of any kind will not be tolerated. *Any assignment that includes plagiarism will receive a zero (0) grade. Students should note that papers will be submitted in Canvas via "Turn-It-In". This program automatically gives the students work a plagiarism score, students should strive for a score less than 20.*
