I. DESCRIPTION

This course is a survey of the Old Testament books in their historical context. The student will learn the themes, purposes, outlines, key people and applications for life from the Old Testament books. Students will learn the chronological order of key events in Old Testament history. (Prerequisite: BI115)

** This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.*

II. OBJECTIVES

- 1.Begin to understand the contexts and themes of the Old Testament books in their progressively-revealed sequence and context. (PLO 1, 2) (A 1, 2, 3, 4, 5)
- 2.Realize the composition and unity of the Old Testament books. (PLO 1, 2) (A 1, 2, 3, 4, 5)
- 3.Appreciate the purpose and place in the canon of each Old Testament book. (PLO 1, 2) (A 1, 2, 3, 5)
- 4.Become aware of applications to one's life from surveying the macro themes, purposes, and metanarratives of each Old Testament book. (PLO 1, 2, 5) (A 1, 2, 3, 5)

III. TEXTBOOKS

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version. My preferred translation is the NASB

IV. REQUIREMENTS

Assignment 2: Read Leviticus-Deuteronomy. Read Hindson and Yates pages 84-119. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (30 points)

Assignment 3: Read Joshua- Ruth. Read Hindson and Yates pages 120-158 In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (30 points)

Assignment 4: Put together 50 slides on Genesis in PowerPoint. The 50 slides must include: title slide, author, recipients, date and place of writing, theme, purposes, key verses with pictures, outline of the book, and maps/charts. Must also include slides on the views of creation (and why Young Earth Creation is the best option) and the Abrahamic Covenant (110 points)

Assignment 5: Read 1-2 Samuel. Read Hindson and Yates pages 159-172. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (30 points)

Assignment 6: Read 1-2 Kings. Read Hindson and Yates pages 173-187. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (30 points)

Assignment 7: Read 1 Chronicles- Esther. Read Hindson and Yates pages 188-231. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (30 points)

Assignment 8: Complete the midterm exam (100 points)

Assignment 10: Read Proverbs- Song of Solomon. Read Hindson and Yates pages 259-286. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (30 points)

Assignment 11: Read Isaiah. Read Hindson and Yates pages 287-311. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (30 points)

Assignment 12: Read Jeremiah- Lamentations. Read Hindson and Yates pages 287-338. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (30 points)

Assignment 13: Read Ezekiel- Daniel. Read Hindson and Yates pages 339-363. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (30 points)

Assignment 14: Read Hosea- Nahum. Read Hindson and Yates pages 365-416. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from

your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (30 points)

Assignment 15: Read Habakkuk- Zechariah. Read Hindson and Yates pages 417-451. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life (30 points)
