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**About This Class: This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.*

COURSE DESCRIPTION

An analytical study of the first Gospel with particular attention given to Matthew's portrayal of Jesus, the themes of the Gospel, narrative analysis, discipleship, and interpretive issues of the book. (Prerequisite: BI115)

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- a. Know the contents, major themes, characters, events, teachings, theology, and the narrative unity and progression of Matthew (PLO 1,2,3,4,5) [A# 1, 2, 3, 4]
- b. Identify and solve major interpretive problems in the book (PLO 1,2,3,4,5) [A# 2, 3, 4]
- c. Learn what the Gospel teaches about Jesus and about discipleship. Learn the appropriate response to Jesus from the various episodes of the book (PLO 1,2,3,4,5) [A# 2, 3]
- d. Interpret individual passages from Matthew (PLO 1,2,3,4,5) [A#1, 4]

- e. Learn how to interpret and apply Matthew as narrative (PLO 1,2,3,4,5) [A#1, 2, 4]

ASSIGNMENTS

Assignment 1: Read Matthew 1-4. Read Toussaint pages 13-85. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life. (48 points)

Assignment 2: Read Matthew 5-10. Read Toussaint pages 85-144. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life. Also complete the discussion board that correlates with the text of these chapters. (138 points)

Assignment 3: Read Matthew 11-13. Read Toussaint pages 147-186. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life. Also complete the discussion board that correlates with the text of these chapters. (138 points)

Assignment 4: Take Midterm Exam. Use the study guide to prepare for the exam. No helps can be used when you take the exam (100 points)

Assignment 5: Read Matthew 14-21. Read Toussaint pages 187-252. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life. Also complete the discussion board that correlates with the text of these chapters. (138 points)

Assignment 6: Read Matthew 22-28. Read Toussaint pages 253-324. In a Word document indicate that you finished this reading assignment and list five things you learned from your textbook reading, and then type out 2 applications for your Bible reading. For each application type out the verse and then how you plan on putting that verse into practice in your life. Also complete the discussion board that correlates with the text of these chapters. (138 points)

Assignment 7: Research Paper. Write a 10- page research paper covering a topic of your choice within the book of Matthew. This topic must be approved by the professor by week 5 (200 points).

Assignment 8: Take Final Exam. Use the study guide to prepare for the exam. No helps can be used when you take the exam (100 points)
