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DESCRIPTION OF THE COURSE

This course will focus on advanced use of the tools and techniques of New Testament exegesis. The exegetical process, including exegetical problem solving, is applied to specific passages within the narrative, epistolary, and prophetic genres of the New Testament, with a view toward a consistent application of the literal grammatical-historical hermeneutic.

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

The student will:

- 1. Learn and apply the steps of exeges is of the Greek New Testament (PLO 1, 5)
- 2. Use electronic Bible study software (Accordance or Logos) in doing exeges is in the Greek New Testament (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5)
- 3. Use the literal grammatical-historical hermeneutic in exeges of the Greek New Testament (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5)
- 4. Learn how to write an exegetical paper on a text from the Greek New Testament (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5)

- 5. Do textual criticism in the Greek New Testament (PLO 1, 5)
- 6. Identify structural markers in the Greek New Testament (PLO 1, 2, 5)
- 7. Do a grammatical diagram and an exegetical outline of a Greek New Testament text (PLO 1, 2, 5)
- 8. Exegete narrative literature in the Greek New Testament (PLO 1, 2, 3, 5)
- 9. Exegete epistolary literature in the Greek New Testament (PLO 1, 2, 3, 5)
- 10. Exegete prophetic literature in the Greek New Testament (PLO 1, 2, 3, 5)

TEXTBOOKS

Textbook: The Bible

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.

Use of Original Language Bible Study Software (Accordance and/or Logos). Students are required to have digital resources to engage Biblical study in the original languages, including but not limited to *Biblia Hebraica Stuttgartensia* (BHS), *Nestle Aland Greek New Testament* 28 (NA28) – both including critical apparatus: *Septuaginta* (LXX), a *Greek Lexicon of the New Testament and Other Early Christian Literature* (BDAG) by Bauer, Danker, Arndt and Gingrich; *Hebrew and Aramaic Lexicon of the Old Testament* (HALOT) by Koehler and Baumgartner.

Assignment #1: Read Beginner's Guide to New Testament Exegesis (pages 1-56) and type a list of 10 things you learned. Read chapters 1, 2 and 3 in Going Deeper with New Testament and do 10 exercises (100 points)

Assignment #2: Read Beginner's Guide to New Testament Exegesis (pages 57 -93) and type a list of 10 things you learned. Read chapters 4, 5, and 6 in Going Deeper with New Testament Greek and do 10 exercises (100 points)

Assignment #3: Read Beginner's Guide to New Testament Exegesis (pages 94-133) and type a list of 10 things you learned from your reading. Read chapters 7, 8, 9 in Going Deeper with New Testament Greek and do 10 exercises. (100 points)

Assignment #4: Read Beginner's Guide to New Testament Exegesis (pages 134-178) and type a list of 10 things you learned from your reading. Read chapters 10, 11, 12 in Going Deeper with New Testament Greek and do 10 exercises (100 points)

Assignment #5: Read Beginner's Guide to New Testament Exegesis (pages 179-220) and type a list of 10 things you learned from your reading. Read chapters 13, 14, 15 in Going Deeper with New Testament Greek and do 10 exercises (100 points)

Assignment #6: Read 200 pages from the Ephesians commentary by Arnold and read what Philip Comfort wrote about the textual problems in Ephesians in his book New Testament Text and Translation Commentary and make a list of 10 things you learned from your reading (100 points)

Assignment #7: Write an exegetical research paper (25–30 pages double spaced) on a text in Ephesians selected by you and approved by the professor OR on a Greek NT text related to your dissertation. You must write a separate one page single spaced paper indicating how you used electronic Bible study software (Accordance or Logos) in doing your research paper (300 points)

Assignment #8: Present your exegetical research paper in the last class and type out evaluations of all the other students' research papers (100 points)
