DESCRIPTION

In this course the student will appraise various views and issues concerning Anthropology, Hamartiology, Christology, Soteriology and Pneumatology. The student will explain the significance of the church debates and doctrinal statements regarding these doctrines. The student will assess the theological differences and discuss the major arguments pro and con in the following debates: Calvinism vs. Arminianism, Free Grace vs. Lordship Salvation, Charismatic vs. Cessationism, and different views in the Historical Adam debate.

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

General competencies to be achieved: The student will:

- 1.Explain and defend biblical Anthropology, Hamartiology, Christology, Soteriology, and Pneumatology
- 2.Define and defend the important theological terms associated with Anthropology, Hamartiology, Christology, Soteriology and Pneumatology
- 3.Explain the history of church debates and doctrinal statements regarding Anthropology, Hamartiology, Christology, Soteriology and Pneumatology

Specific competencies to be achieved: The student will

- 1.Explain the meaning and significance of man as the image of God (*imago dei*)
- 2.Critique the arguments of those who hold to the evolution of Adam
- 3.Give biblical and theological arguments for a historical Adam and Eve and historical Fall of man into sin
- 4.Explain the hypostatic union and give biblical and theological arguments for the deity and sinless humanity of Jesus Christ
- 5.Explain the finished work of Christ on the cross (substitutionary atonement, redemption, reconciliation, propitiation)
- 6.Explain the theological differences in the debate of Free Grace and Lordship Salvation
- 7.Explain the theological differences in the debate regarding Calvinism and Arminianism

REQUIRED TEXTBOOKS

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB), English Standard Version (ESV), New King James Version (NKJV), or King James Version (KJV). Other translations like NLT and NIV may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have any questions about a particular translation or version.

REQUIRED: ORIGINAL LANGUAGE BIBLE STUDY SOFTWARE (Accordance, Bible Works, Logos)

Students are required to have digital resources to engage Biblical study in the original languages, including but not limited to *Biblia Hebraica Stuttgartensia (BHS)*, *Nestle Aland 28 (NA28)* – both including critical apparatus; *Septuaginta (LXX)*, *a Greek Lexicon of the New Testament and Other Early Christian Literature (BDAG)* by Bauer, Danker, Arndt, and Gingrich; *Hebrew and Aramaic Lexicon of the Old Testament (HALOT)* by Koehler and Baumgartner.

ASSIGNMENTS

Assignment #1: Read the book *Historical Theology* (Parts 3, 4 and 5 on the Doctrine of Humanity, The Doctrines of Christ and the Holy Spirit, and The Doctrine of the Application of Redemption) and write a paper listing 20 things you learned from your reading (100 points)

Assignment #2: Give a lecture to the class (30 minutes using Powerpoint) on a topic from Anthropology, Hamartiology, Christology, Soteriology or Pneumatology selected by the professor for you. (100 points)

Assignment #3: Debate: Calvinism vs. Arminianism. Students will debate this topic in class. The professor will assign students to defend each of the views (100 points).

Assignment #4: Read the book *Freely By His Grace* edited by Hixson, Whitmire, and Zuck and type a book review (six pages and double spaced). (100 points)

Assignment #5: Debate: Free Grace vs. Lordship Salvation. Students will debate this topic in class. The professor will assign students to defend each of the views. (100 points)

Assignment #6: Read the book *Are Miraculous Gifts for Today?* by Wayne Grudem and type a book review (six pages and double spaced) (100 points)

Assignment #7: Debate: Cessationism vs. Continuationism. Students will debate this topic in class. The professor will assign students to defend each of the views (100 points)

Assignment #8: Write a research paper of 25-30 pages (double spaced and following Turabian format). The topic for the research paper must be on a specific topic from one of these doctrines: Anthropology, Hamartiology, Christology, Soteriology or Pneumatology. Each topic selected by the student must be approved by the professor. Each student will write on a different topic. The student will present the results of his research in the last class of the course. (300 points)
