I. DESCRIPTION

A study of worship literature from Bible times to the present, tracing the historical development of music in worship. Practical information on various styles of worship, programming music for a worship service, and analyzing the construction and theology of music will be explored. (*Interdisciplinary Bible Course)

*This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for inperson attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

III. REQUIREMENTS

- A. Reading:
 - 1. Read the assigned textbooks for this course.
 - 2. Journal. Read 1 edition of Worship Leader magazine. Write a review and place in course notebook.
 - 3. Online/website. Locate one traditional and one contemporary worship music website, survey the sites and write a review summarizing the content. Place your reviews in the course notebook.
- B. Notebook:

Prepare a notebook of appropriate music for worship. Include both traditional and contemporary songs. This will become a resource for service planning. Include lead sheets, chord/lyrics charts or print music that includes chords. Organize the songs in the notebook and include an index or chart listing the songs, keys, tempos, and other. Notebook must contain a minimum of 50 songs.

C. Music selection:

The student will create 6 orders of service based on readings.

D. Course notebook:

Create a notebook for this course that will include dividers or sections on all key categories/topics included in this course.

E. Attendance:

All students must attend class. Campus students must **attend** the class in person at the scheduled time and location.

If you miss a class, it is YOUR responsibility to find out **what was done what was assigned**, and to **be prepared** when you return to your next class.
