# Syllabus

**Course:** PSY310-D-ND Human Sexuality & the Biblical Worldview

## I. DESCRIPTION

This course will focus on a general overview of the human sexuality and a proper perspective of sexual intercourse and sexuality from the biblical worldview. Topics will include cohabitation, marriage and physical intimacy, and other sexual issues.

*This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.*

## II. OBJECTIVES

### A. General competencies to be achieved. The student will:

1. Recognize human sexuality from a Biblical worldview (PLO 1).
2. Recognize the objective of sexual intercourse in a marital relationship (PLO 1, 4, 5).
3. Identify the distinctive reproductive system of men and women (PLO 4, 5).
4. Explain the different sexual disorders and their criteria (PLO 4, 5).
5. Prepare students for graduate level study (PLO 6).

### B. Specific competencies to be achieved. The student will:

1. Learn the different types of sexual behavior (PLO 4, 5).
2. Learn the differences between sexual disorders (PLO 4, 5).
3. Learn the difference between homosexuality and transgenderism (PLO 4, 5).
4. Explain sexual deviancy in detail (PLO 4, 5).
5. Learn the destructive nature of sexual abuse, violence and addiction (PLO 4, 5)

### III. REQUIREMENTS

#### A. Reading Assignments

**Reading Journals:** (two full pages each) the student will give the main points of the chapters read and reaction/reflection on the reading. The student will also share his/her own thoughts or opinions about the subject of the material. The student will also share how this information might be used in his/her own life (or not), and why. The personal reflection section may be written in the first person. There will be a total of seven (6) journals. **Each journal is worth 25 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

#### B. Written Assignments

**Human Sexuality Canvas Discussion:** **Note: You must have a webcam in order to complete this assignment.** The student will examine a topic on the lifespan each week that will be given by the instructor, which they must comment on and offer insight on posting a 5–10-minute video on. Each student will respond to at least 2 classmates with a 3–5-minute video reply. There will be a total of **seven** (7) Canvas discussions. **Each discussion is worth 30 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

**Key Term Assignment:** Student will read, write down, and submit the key terms that are relevant to the chapter they are reading. There will be **seven** (7) assignments. **Each assignment is worth 20 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

**Human Sexuality Assignment:** (one (1) page maximum): Student will read case studies and identify some of the identifiable problems concerning human sexuality. Students are to write out the assignment in paragraph form detailing the important quality of each stage and how they would address the issue in the vignette. **Each assignment is worth 25 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

#### C. Quizzes

There will be **seven** (7) quizzes in this course. The quizzes will cover information from the lectures from the previous week and will be taken on CANVAS. They will consist of true/false multiple choice and fill in the blank. There will be **five** (5) quizzes. **Each quiz is worth 10 points each** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

**D. Final Exam:** The final exam will consist of 50 questions and will cover information presented and discussed in class. The exam questions will not be taken from the textbooks unless the information was also covered in class. The final will include true/false; fill in the blank, and multiple choice (or guess). **The final exam will be worth 100 points** (GC 1, 2, 3, 4; SC 1, 2, 3, 4, 5).

**E. Class Participation and Behavior**

Students are expected to maintain classroom decorum that includes respect for other students and the professor, prompt and excellent attendance, and an attitude that seeks to take full advantage of the educational opportunity. Students are to refrain from using cell phones and handheld devices during class. Playing games, browsing the internet, using email, instant messaging, or text messaging, etc. are considered unacceptable when class is in session. In addition, the student will be expected to contribute to class discussions in a positive manner which shows respect for the views of others. Failure to maintain this standard may result in a **full letter grade deduction from their overall grade.**

Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. There are eight (8) class sessions, which correspond to the eight-week cycle. **Each class participation session is worth 25 points.**

0-10 percent of AI*	No points deducted from your paper/project.
11-20 percent of AI*	A third of your overall points are deducted from your paper/project.
21-30 percent of AI*	75% of your overall points will be deducted from your paper/project.
30+ Percent of AI	You will receive no points for the paper/project.

**\*Keep in mind this deduction is *added* to the points that you would lose due to other things (Improper writing style, grammar, etc.).**

### **Writing Style**

All class papers must follow the APA style according to *APA Publication Manual 7<sup>th</sup> edition*.

### **Late Work**

Papers, projects, etc. are due at the class period assigned. Unless under extreme circumstances, which will be determined at the discretion of the instructor. **No late work will be accepted.**
