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DESCRIPTION

A study of the origin and nature of the Bible; a study of the nature and attributes of God; a study of the person and work of the Holy Spirit. (Prerequisites: COM110 or concurrent enrollment in COM110, BI115) [ILO-1, 2, & 3]

* This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for inperson attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

OBJECTIVES

 - 3. Provide practical application of traditional Christian Bibliology, Theology Proper, and Pneumatology to real life (PLO- 3, 4) (A- 1, 2).

- 1. Explain and defend traditional Christian Bibliology from the Bible (PLO- 1, 2) (A- 3, 4, 5).
- 2. Explain and defend traditional Christian Theology Proper from the Bible (PLO- 1, 2) (A- 3, 6, 7).
- 3. Explain and defend traditional Christian Pneumatology from the Bible (PLO- 1, 2) (A- 3, 8, 9).
- 4. Research and articulate the traditional Christian understanding of a significant issue in Bibliology, Theology Proper, or Pneumatology (PLO- 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A- 3).
- 5. Articulate practical, real-life application of the traditional Christian Bibliology, Theology Proper, and Pneumatology] (PLO- 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A- PR8, 1, 2).

TEXTBOOKS

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.

ASSIGNMENTS

[Note: Further instructions for how to do each of the following assignments is presented in in the specific assignment link in Canvas.]

- **Assignment #1**: Respond to each week's discussion with a 100-word statement of the following question: What was the most significant truth we discussed this week and how it will affect how you live, how you will serve Christ, how you will talk about your relationship with God. (8 @ 150 points).
- **Assignment #2**: Select 1 of the topics to be discussed in class and prepare 5-minute introduction to the topic. Include in your presentation the following: (1) a brief introduction of yourself, (2) a definition of the topic, (3) a key passage in which the definition is seen with a brief explanation of the passage, and (4) a significant question about the topic which someone you know needs God's answer for. (50 points)
- **Assignment #3**: Research a significant topic in Bibliology, Theology Proper, OR Pneumatology then write a 1500-word (5 pages) Research Essay (i.e., include a title page, footnotes, and Bibliography) summarizing your biblical conclusions. Select just ONE of the following topics. (200 points)
 - -Bibliology: Describe and defend the "closing" of the Canon of the Christian Scriptures.
 - -Theology Proper: Define and defend the sovereignty of God.
 - -Pneumatology: Describe and defend the "cessation" of the giving of the gifts of the Holy Spirit.
- **Assignment #4**: Read *From God to Us* (entire) by Geisler and Nix and *Basic Theology* (Section III, "The Bible: God-Breathed") by Ryrie and answer the 10 Questions assignment in Canvas about Bibliology. (150 points).

- **Assignment #5**: Take the Bibliology Exam. There are 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice). Use the study guide to prepare for the exam. The exam is "open book" but also timed (100 points).
- **Assignment #6**: Read *Basic Theology* (Section II, "The Living and True God") by Ryrie, then create a list of 10 things you learned about Theology Proper and answer the 10 Questions assignment in Canvas about Theology Proper. (150 points).
- **Assignment #7**: Take the Theology Proper Exam. There are 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice). Use the study guide to prepare for the exam. The exam is "open book" but also timed (100 points).
- **Assignment #8**: Read *Basic Theology* (Section XI, "The Holy Spirit") by Ryrie and answer the 10 Questions assignment in Canvas about Pneumatology. (150 points).
- **Assignment #9**: Pneumatology Exam. There are 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice). Use the study guide to prepare for the exam. The exam is "open book" but also timed (100 points).
