I. DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to learn and experience vocal and presentational techniques through the preparation and performance of songs, arias, and operatic roles. This course provides students with opportunity to study, develop, and improve dramatic skills out of their voice studio. Recommended for all music, vocal, and acting majors and minors, but open to all students with the consent of the instructor.

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

II. OBJECTIVES

1. Student will learn and memorize words and music of selected operas or musical theaters, arias, songs and scenes.

1. Class participation: you are expected to be at each class meeting.
2. Musical preparation out of class: Most of the work in class will be blocking and acting techniques. You **MUST** prepare your music and/or dialogue outside of class. **All scenes will be performed from memory.**
3. Character analysis: examine how your character and scene relates to the entire work. Your analysis should make reference to various elements of life, such as attitude, appearance, friends, enemies, social status, relationship to other characters, etc.
