COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an introduction and synthetic overview of the Old Testament historical books: Genesis through Esther.

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person. Online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

TEXTBOOKS

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages), including any of the following: New American Standard Bible (NASB), English Standard Version (ESV), New King James Version (NKJV) or King James Version (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (paraphrases and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV) may be used for supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have any questions about a translations or version.

ASSIGNMENTS

1.Read Genesis through Deuteronomy and *Kingdom of Priests* (pages 1-109) and indicate in a Word document that you have finished the reading and list 20 things you learned in your reading from the Bible and textbook. Also list 20 applications for life from your reading of the Bible text. Post the Word document in Assignments in Canvas (100 points)

2. Do Bible Book Chapter Summaries for Genesis through Deuteronomy. Each Bible Book Chapter Summary must include the Message of the Book, and a two to three sentence summary of each chapter. (Example: Genesis 1 – Creation. Moses gives a detailed account of six day creation. On Day 1 God created the heavens, the earth and light. On day 2 God created...) (100 points)

3.Read Joshua through 2 Samuel and *Kingdom of Priests* (pages 110-301) and indicate in a Word document that you have finished the reading and list 20 things you learned in your reading from the Bible and textbook. Also list 20 applications for life from your reading of the Bible text. Post the Word document in Assignments in Canvas. (100 points)

4.Do Bible Book Chapter Summaries for Joshua, Judges, Ruth, 1 Samuel and 2 Samuel. Each Bible Book Chapter Summary must include the Message of the Book, and a two to three sentence summary of each chapter. (Example: Genesis 1 – Creation. Moses gives a detailed account of six day creation. On Day 1 God created the heavens, the earth and light. On day 2 God created...) (100 points)

5.Read 1 Kings through Esther and *Kingdom of Priests* (pages 302-527) and indicate in a Word document that you have finished the reading and list 20 things you learned from your reading. Also list 20 applications for life from your reading of the Bible texts. Post the Word document in Assignments in Canvas. (100 points)

6.Do Bible Book Chapter Summaries for 1 Kings, 2 Kings, 1 Chronicles, 2 Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah and Esther. Each Bible Book Chapter Summary must include the Message of the Book, and a two to three sentence summary of each chapter. (Example: Genesis 1 – Creation. Moses gives a detailed account of six day creation. On Day 1 God created the heavens, the earth and light. On day 2 God created...)(100 points)

7.Research Paper: Write and type a research paper (12-15 pages double spaced) on a topic from the Pentateuch (Genesis-Deuteronomy) and the Historical Books (Joshua-Esther). The student can select the topic but it must be approved by the professor. The research paper must follow Turabian format. (300 points)

8.Final Exam: Take the Final Exam on the OT Historical Books (Genesis through Esther). There are 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice questions). No helps can be used. Do your best for the glory of the Lord Jesus Christ (100 points)
