# Syllabus

## BI621 - NEW TESTAMENT OVERVIEW II

**Course:** BI621 LG - New Testament Overview II  
**Credit:** Three credits

### DESCRIPTION

This course is an introduction and synthetic overview of Acts and the Pauline epistles (Romans through Philemon).

*This is a blended class, meaning that both campus and online students take this class together. Campus students attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. All interaction and assignments for campus and online students are done in the online classroom.*

### OBJECTIVES

- 1.Explain the history of the early church and argument of the book of Acts.

- 2.Explain the historical background and argument of each of the Pauline epistles (Romans through Philemon) (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A 1, 2, 5, 6)

- 1.Explain the chronology of the early church from the book of Acts.

- 2.Explain the chronology of Paul's life and the time of writing of each of his epistles

3.Explain how the Pauline epistles solve problems for Christians and the church

(PLO 3, 4, 5) (A 1, 4)

## TEXTBOOKS

The Bible- KJV, NKJV, NASB, ESV

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.

## ASSIGNMENTS

**Assignment #1:** Answer Research Questions 1-10 in Discussion Forum. Interact with one other student for each question (post a response or question). Start some discussions. (100 points)

**Assignment #2:** Answer questions 11-20 in Discussions. Interact with one other student for each question (post a response or question). (100 points).

**Assignment #3:** Read the book of Acts and the Pauline Epistles (Romans through Philemon) and type out a list of 30 applications for your life. For each application type out the verse reference, the verse and the application. (100 points).

**Assignment #4:** Read the textbook *An Introduction to the New Testament* by Carson and Moo on Acts and the Pauline Epistles (Romans through Philemon) and type out a list of 20 things you learned from the textbook (100 points)

**Assignment #5:** Write and type a book summary for the book of Acts along with all of the epistles of Paul (two pages single spaced for each book = 28 pages for 14 books). (300 points)

**Assignment #6:** Answer questions 20-30 in Discussions. Interact with one other student for each question (post a response or question). (100 points)

**Assignment #7:** Final Exam over Acts and Pauline Epistles. 50 questions are on the exam (true/false and multiple choice). No helps can be used on this exam. Do your best for the glory of the Lord Jesus Christ. (100 points)

**Assignment #8: Post weekly attendance reports under Announcements (100 points)**

Students are expected to be in class (in-person and online). In-person students are expected to be in their seats on the day and time that the class meets. Online students are expected to participate in the class in Microsoft Teams on the day and time that the class meets. All students should post their attendance each week in Canvas (see Announcements each week for attendance reports). All students should also list three things that they learned from the weekly lecture.

Excused Absence = the student has notified the professor in an email that he or she will not be in class and gives the reason why.

Unexcused Absence = (1) the student did not attend class, (2) the student did not watch the video lecture for the week, (3) the student did not report his or her attendance in Canvas for the week

**Attendance Grade**

100 = student attends every class and reports attendance in Canvas  
90 = student misses one class or fails to report attendance for one class in Canvas  
80 = student misses two classes or fails to report attendance for two classes in Canvas

**Rubric for Grading New Testament Book Summary**

Name of Book

Big Idea of NT Book – In one sentence or two give the big idea of the New Testament book.

Outline of the Book – Give a detailed outline of the book explaining the argument of the book.

You can explain the key ideas for each chapter. For example:

Acts 1 – The Ascension of Christ to heaven. The Apostles Pray in the Upper Room. The Apostles select Matthias to be the 12<sup>th</sup> apostle.

Acts 2 -The Holy Spirit comes upon the apostles and they speak in tongues. Peter preaches the gospel and 3000 Jews are saved, baptized and added to the church. Luke describes what life was like in the early church as they were devoted to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship: the breaking of bread and prayer.
