## I. DESCRIPTION:

Training in the principles of oral communication and the application of these principles to public speaking so the student may communicate effectively with the society in which he lives. (Prerequisite: EN112) (BOT- #2, 3, 5, 6, 8)

## III. REQUIREMENTS

\*Note: Specific instructions for each assignment are posted in Canvas.

## A. Read the course textbook and write responses

- 1. Some textbook concepts will be discussed in class, but it will be up to you to thoroughly read and glean valuable information from the text.
- 2. You will write thoughtful two-page responses for each segment of reading. A rubric will be provided in Canvas.

## B. Evaluate talks.

- Listen to assigned talks and submit an evaluation of each of these talks.
- 2. Following the presentation of the course extemporaneous talks and using the evaluation form, critically evaluate **one (1)** of your own talks.
- 3. **Note**: During the course when other students are presenting talks, you will critically evaluate their talks.

# C. Develop and deliver a variety of talks.

- 1. Present the following kinds of talks:
  - a. Personal Story:
  - b. Informative:
  - c. Persuasive:
  - d. Edifying (Biblical/Spiritual)
- 2. For each of the talks you present, submit the following:
  - a. Talk Preparation Sheet
  - b. Talk notes (talk presentation).
  - c. Prerecorded video (for online students only)
  - d. Presentation Materials (Slides, Charts).

3. **Note**: All "Blended" (and some in-class) students must record all (or some) of the talks and upload the video file in time to be shown in class so that the talks may be peer-review by all students.

# D. Create and use media for accompanying talks.

- 1. For the talks presented in class, use one or more of the following:
  - a. Slides (Powerpoint, Google, Presi, etc.)
  - b. Video clip
  - c. Schematic/map/chart/handout/etc.
  - d. Object

# E. Take quizzes.

- 1. Demonstrate comprehension of the following topics through 3 quizzes:
  - a. The biblical mandates & ethics which guide Christian public oral communication and the communication process
  - b. The talk preparation process
  - c. Cumulative review

## IV. METHODS

### A. Presentation:

- **1. In-class methods:** class discussions, evaluating talks, giving talks, and taking tests & quizzes.
  - \* Attendance: Students are required to attend the class section for which they enroll: online students may attend via livestream or by watching the recorded lecture; in-class students must attend in class. In-class students may not choose to attend online without approval of the instructor.

Attendance is taken for all in-class and livestream students.

Online students who attend asynchronously are required to submit all in-class activities on Canvas in the "Participation Activities Week X" assignment. Late Participation Activities are counted as absences.

Students with more than two absences will be dropped from the course.

### \*About Classroom Use of Media:

- -Computing devices are permitted during the lecture and class discussion sessions for the sole purpose of taking notes. Use of these devices to access the Internet, make telephone calls or video calls, text messaging, updating social network services, etc. is not allowed, as it is very distracting to other students.
- **-Cellphones / smartphones** may only be used in an emergency.

- 2. Out-of-class methods: observation, evaluation, and sermon preparation.
  - \*About written assignments: Unless directed otherwise, all written assignments must follow the Turabian style according to A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations, 8th edition and the Calvary Style Guide, 2019 update.

# B. Grading:

- \*Assignments have a due date: Assignments turned in late will be lowered 5% each class day it is late.
- \*Assignments have an "available until" date. It is usually 4 days past the assignment due date. Once the assignment has passed the available date, it will not be reopened.
- \*Plagiarism: Plagiarism is defined as copying any content without identifying the source. This also includes taking another person's or AI entity's ideas or constructs and presenting them as your own. Plagiarism of any kind will not be tolerated.

Most assignments at Calvary require the student to produce original work. In these cases, the use of AI-generated content is prohibited (even if cited) as it does not represent original work created by the student and is an unreliable aggregate of ideas from other sources.

AI, however, may be utilized in cases where the instructor has allowed, or even required, the use of AI to accomplish specific tasks. In these cases, AIgenerated (or modified) content may be submitted by the student. If there are any questions as to the permissibility of AI use for an assignment, please ask your instructor for clarification.

- \* AI generated text: You are not permitted to use AI to either generate or refine your speech scripts. This will be treated as plagiarism per university policy. Please note that this included Grammarly's AI features.
- \*About course grade: See the grading scale in the University Catalog for specific grading scale that will be used for final course grade.

- 1. English Bible (NAS, NASB-U, NKJV, NET, ESV, or other by approval).
  - -The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (paraphrases, and thoughtfor-thought translations like NLT and NIV) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.
