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I. **DESCRIPTION**

A foundational study of song-leading, rehearing and conducting techniques, information, and materials for the church and school choral director. Includes rehearing and conducting a variety of basic choral literature in class and using a laboratory group. (Prerequisite: MU221 or permission of the professor)

*This is a blended class, meaning that both campus students and online students take this class together. Campus students attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom.

III. COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- A. **Personal conducting practice outside of class**. Each week there will be song-leading, conducting and/or rehearsing assignments that the student will need to work on outside of class and present in class for constructive help, improvement, and grading. The student is expected to spend at least 1- 2 hours per week on conducting practice or rehearsal preparation.
- B. **Reading**. The student should expect to spend 1-2 hours per week on required reading.
- C. **Research Project**. Do a research project on working with either a children's, middle or high school choir or church choir. Present a written paper as well as an oral summary of the project to the class. This will be a cooperative project with other students. More details will be given by the instructor.
- D. **Choral listening and/or choral concert attendance**. The student is to listen to a minimum of 1-2 hours of choral music. This may be fulfilled by listening to recordings and/or by attending non-Calvary choral concerts. More details regarding what is to be listened to and report forms will be given by the instructor.
- E. General concert attendance. The student is required to attend the fall events of the

Calvary Fine Arts Series. If the student is not able, for an approved reason cleared with the instructor, to attend one of the Calvary Fine Arts events, they may locate another appropriate concert in the Kansas City area approved by the instructor. The student is also required to attend any Calvary senior recitals scheduled this semester.

F. **Final exam**. There will be **two parts** to the final exam. **Part I** will be a conducting final reflecting the student's progress on song-leading and conducting techniques learned. **Part II** will be a practical written exam covering all reading and in-class materials. The final exams will be administered during exam week. See separate Exam schedule for when inclass exam will take place for this course.

V. METHODS

- A. In-class methods will include lecture, demonstration, practice, discussion, song-leading, conducting, rehearsing, listening, and oral presentation.
- B. Out-of-class methods will include personal practice, reading, observation, research, completion of projects, listening, and study.
