# I. DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory-level course in expository preaching seeking to produce adequate techniques pertaining to pulpit ministry. The student will have ample opportunity to apply the principles of sermon preparation and delivery before the class. Requires the preparation of preaching manuscripts. (ILOs – 1, 2, 3, 4, 5)

# II. OBJECTIVES

- A. General competencies to be achieved: The student will be able to . . .
  - 1. Articulate the nature and value of expository preaching. (PLO- #4) (A- A, F, & G)
  - 2. Demonstrate primary skills in preparing and delivering expository sermons. (PLO- #2) (A- B, C, E, & D)
  - 3. Sense the high privilege and burden of communicating God's Word clearly, accurately, relevantly, and passionately. (PLO- #1) (A- A, F, & G)

  - 5. Increase understanding of effective preaching through the critical evaluation of other preachers preaching. (PLO- #1, 2, 3, & 4) (A- E)
  - 6. Analyze pertinent biblical texts to demonstrate understanding of the varied tasks of effective preaching. (PLO- #1, 2, 3, & 4) (A- F)
  - 7. Articulate a personal philosophy of preaching. (PLO- #1 & 4) (A- G)

# III. MATERIALS

## A. Required Textbooks:

- 1. The Gospel of John, NASBU, ESV, or NET.
  - -The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.

# IV. REQUIREMENTS

\***Note**: Specific instructions for each assignment are posted in Canvas.

#### A. Read the course textbook and answer discussion questions.

- 1. Following the schedule below, read the assigned chapters in the textbooks in preparation for in-class discussion.
- 2. Following the schedule below, answer discussion questions concerning the textbook and course material.

#### B. Do exegetical study of passages.

1. Select a specific NT book to study for preparing sermons to preach for the course (except for the 5<sup>th</sup> sermon – specific passages will be assigned):

- a. Sermons 1–4: an NT Epistle.
- b. Sermon 5: a Christmas Passage.
- 2. Submit the results of this study which identifies the following for each passage to be preached:
  - a. Exegetical Idea (the author's main point).
  - b. Purpose (the reason the author intended for this passage).
  - c. Question (the practical question the author answers in the passage for his intended audience).
  - d. Outline (the way the author structured his material to reveal his idea, accomplish his purpose, and answer the question).

#### C. Prepare original sermons.

1. Taking the results of your exegetical study for each selected/assigned passage, prepare 5 sermons to accomplish the following purposes:

Sermon #1 – To show basic sermon outline structure.
Sermon #2 – To Explain the truth of the passage.
Sermon #3 – To Convince the audience to believe the truth of the passage.
Sermon #4 – To Apply the truth of the passage to the lives of the audience.
Sermon #5 – Christmas passage: Student choice for the sermon purpose.

- 2. Taking the results of the exegetical study, prepare the following sermon elements for each selected/assigned passage.
  - a. A sermon Main Idea (the point the sermon is to communication).
  - b. A Purpose Statement (the result the preacher intends in the lives of the listeners upon heard the sermon).
  - c. A sermon Question (the practical question the passage answers applicable to the intended audience).
  - d. A sermon Outline (the guide for the speaker's and listeners thoughts).
  - e. Manuscripts (word-for-word) of each of the following elements for each of the 5 sermons.
    - i. The Introduction.
    - ii. 2 illustrations to be used in the Body of the sermon (not those in the Introduction and Conclusion).
    - iii. The Conclusion.

#### D. Preach original sermons.

- 1. Each sermon must be original (i.e., you have never preached this passage / sermon before).
- 2. Each sermon should be no more than 30 minutes in length.
- 3. In-class or live streaming students will preach "live" each evening; students whose schedules do not allow you to preach "live" make video recordings of all sermons available by 3 pm the afternoon before the class session in which it is scheduled to be presented. The course instructor will show these recordings to the in-class session for all to see and critique.

#### E. Evaluate sermons.

- 1. During the class, you will evaluate 3 sermons of seasoned preachers as directed by the course instructor.
- 2. For the 1<sup>st</sup> & 5<sup>th</sup> sermons you preach, complete a "Self-Evaluation" form of your own preaching.

#### F. Do exegetical study of a passage pertinent to preaching.

- 1. Study only 1 of the following passages defining significant terms and understanding the author's argument relevant to preaching:
  - a. 1 Corinthians 2:1–5 OR
  - b. 2 Timothy 4:1–5
- 2. Write a 5-page paper expository paper presenting the author's meaning and the practical significance of the passage to the preaching task today.

## V. METHODS

#### A. Presentation:

- **1. In-class methods:** lecture, discussion, presentation, and evaluation.
  - \*About Class Attendance: Research consistently demonstrates that class attendance and active participation correlate to higher performance on course assessments. Therefore, the following attendance policies will be followed to encourage greatest course engagement.

#### \*About Classroom Use of Media:

- -**Computing devices** are permitted during the lecture and class discussion sessions for the sole purpose of taking notes. Use of these devices to access the Internet, make telephone calls or video calls, text messaging, updating social network services, etc. is not allowed, let alone very distracting to other students.
- -**Cellphones / smartphones** may only be used in an emergency, and in those situations the student may take the call but must leave the room and not return until the next break out of courtesy to fellow classmates.
- \*About Note Taking: Students are expected to take notes during each class. Significant peer reviewed studies continue to demonstrate that notes taken by hand are understood better and remembered longer than those taken with a computer. Computer use which is a distraction to others (i.e., noise, blocking the screen, displaying non-class related material, etc.) is not allowed.
- 2. Out-of-class methods: observation, evaluation, and sermon preparation.
  - \*About written assignments: Unless directed otherwise, all written assignments must follow the Turabian style according to A Manual for

*Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, 8th edition and the Calvary Style Guide, 2019 update.

- B. Grading:
  - \*About Late Assignments: Assignments turned in late will be lowered 5% each class day it is late.
  - \*About Plagiarism: Plagiarism is defined as copying any content without identifying the source. This also includes taking another person's or AI entity's ideas or constructs and presenting them as your own. Plagiarism of any kind will not be tolerated. Most assignments at Calvary require the student to produce original work. Therefore, unless specifically permitted by the instructor, the use of AI-generated content is prohibited (even if cited) as it does not represent original work created by the student and is an unreliable aggregate of ideas from other sources. AI, however, may be utilized in cases where the instructor has explicitly permitted its use to accomplish specific tasks.
