COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an introduction and synthetic overview of the Old Testament prophetic books: Isaiah through Malachi.

This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person. Online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

As a result of taking this course the student will:

- 1.Know the basic content of the Old Testament prophetic books (Isaiah-Malachi) (PLO 1-5)
- 2.Be able to identify the key people, places, and events in Old Testament history (PLO 1-5)
- 3.Identify the author, historical background, theme and purpose of these OT books: Isaiah-Malachi. (PLO 1-5)
- 4. Find applications to his or her life through the reading of the OT books (Isaiah-Malachi) (PLO 1-5)

COURSE TEXTBOOKS

The Bible: The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB), English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Assignment 1 – Read through the books of Isaiah-Malachi according to the class schedule and make a list of 50 applications for life from your reading (200 points)

Assignment 2 – Read through the textbook *Encountering the Old Testament* for Isaiah-Malachi and type out a list of 50 things you learned from reading this textbook (200 points)

Assignment 3 – Type a 1-2 page summary message and outline of each OT book (Isaiah-Malachi). (400 points)

Assignment 4 – Write a research paper (10 pages double spaced) on a topic from Isaiah-Malachi. The topic of the research paper must be approved by the professor (100 points)

Assignment 5 – Take a final exam on the books of Isaiah-Malachi. The exam will have 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice). (100 points)

Week 8 Post-Exilic Prophets to Judah: Haggai, Zechariah, Malachi
