DESCRIPTION

This course explains the biblical and theological arguments for dispensational premillennialism. Students will learn the significance of the biblical covenants and their relationship to the dispensations. Students will critique amillennialism, covenant premillennialism, progressive dispensationalism, and progressive covenantalism.

* This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.

OBJECTIVES

A. General competencies to be achieved. The student will:

- 1. Explain and defend dispensational premillennialism from the Bible (PLO 3, 4) (A1-6)
- 2. Evaluate and critique amillennialism from a dispensational premillennial perspective (PLO 4) (A 1-3, 5, 6)
- 3. Evaluate and critique covenant theology from a dispensational premillennial perspective (PLO 4) (A1-3, 5, 6)
- 4. Explain the unconditional biblical covenants for Israel (Abrahamic, Land, Davidic and New covenants) and their fulfillment from the Bible (PLO 1, 2, 3) (A1-3, 5, 6)
- 5. Evaluate and critique covenant premillennialism from a dispensational premillennial perspective (PLO 4) (A1-3, 5, 6)
- 6. Evaluate and critique progressive covenantalism from a dispensational premillennial perspective (PLO 4) (A 1-3, 5, 6)
- 7. Evaluate and critique progressive dispensationalism (PLO 4) (A 1-3, 5, 6)

B. Specific competencies to be achieved. The student will (will be able to):

- 1. Explain and defend the pretribulation Rapture of the Church (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4) (A 3,4, 5, 6)
- 2. Explain the times of the Gentiles (PLO 1, 2) (A 3, 5, 6)

TEXTBOOKS

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.

ASSIGNMENTS

Assignment 1: Read *Dispensationalism* by Ryrie and answer questions 1-10 in Discussions (200 points)

Assignment 2: Read *Understanding End Times Prophecy* and answer questions 11-20 in Discussions (200 points)

Assignment 3: Write a research paper of 10-12 pages (double spaced) and following Turabian style critiquing one of the following theological systems: covenant theology, amillennialism, new covenant theology, progressive covenantalism, progressive dispensationalism, covenant premillennialism, or postmillennialism (200 points)

Assignment 4: Read *Maranatha: Our Lord, Come* by Showers and answer questions 21-30 in Discussions (200 points)

Assignment 5: Final Exam. The final exam will have 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice). No helps can be used on this exam. Do your best for the glory of the Lord Jesus Christ (100 points)

Assignment 6: Attendance and Reports (100 points)

MABT students are expected to be in class (resident students) or on Microsoft Teams (online student) on the day and time that the class meets.
