## DESCRIPTION

A study of the origin and nature of the Bible; a study of the nature and attributes of God; a study of the person and work of the Holy Spirit. (Prerequisites: GE101 or concurrent enrollment in GE101, BI115)

*\* This course is offered in two formats: in-person and online. Students registered for in-person attend the classes in person, online students attend the classes via the online classroom. For both in-person and online students, assignments and interaction outside of the class period are done in the learning management system.*

## OBJECTIVES

**A. General competencies to be achieved.** The student will be able to . . .

1. Explain and defend the traditional Christian Bibliology, Theology Proper, and Pneumatology from the Bible (PLO- 1, 2, 5) (A- 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9).
2. Explain and defend the traditional Christian understanding of significant theology issues in Bibliology, Theology Proper, and Pneumatology (PLO- 1, 2, 5) (A- 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9).
3. Provide practical application of traditional Christian Bibliology, Theology Proper, and Pneumatology to real life (PLO- 3, 4) (A- 1, 2).

**B. Specific competencies to be achieved.** The student will (will be able to) . . .

1. Explain and defend traditional Christian Bibliology from the Bible (PLO- 1, 2) (A- 3, 4, 5).
2. Explain and defend traditional Christian Theology Proper from the Bible (PLO- 1, 2) (A- 3, 6, 7).
3. Explain and defend traditional Christian Pneumatology from the Bible (PLO- 1, 2) (A- 3, 8, 9).
4. Research and articulate the traditional Christian understanding of a significant issue in Bibliology, Theology Proper, or Pneumatology (PLO- 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A- 3).
5. Articulate practical, real-life application of the traditional Christian Bibliology, Theology Proper, and Pneumatology] (PLO- 1, 2, 3, 4, 5) (A- PR8, 1, 2).

## TEXTBOOKS

The Bible is a required textbook in every course at Calvary University. To facilitate academic level study, students are required to use for assignments and research an English translation or version of the Bible based on formal equivalence (*meaning that the translation is generally word-for-word from the original languages*), including any of the following: New American Standard (NASB, English Standard Version (ESV), New King James (NKJV), or King James (KJV). Other translations and versions based on dynamic equivalence (*paraphrases, and thought-for-thought translations like NLT and NIV*) may be used as supplemental sources. Please ask the professor if you have questions about a particular translation or version.

## ASSIGNMENTS

[Note: Further instructions for how to do each of the following assignments is presented in the specific assignment link in Canvas.]

**Assignment #1: Topic Discussions** – Respond to each week’s topic with either a 100-word written reply OR a 2/3-minute video recorded answer to a question posed by the instructor. (8 @ 10 points each, 80 points total).

**Assignment #2: Topic Introductions** – Select 3 of the topics to be discussed in class and prepare 5-minute introduction to the topic. Include in your presentation the following: (1) a brief introduction of yourself (only in your 1<sup>st</sup> introduction), (2) a definition of the topic, (3) a key passage in which the definition is seen with a brief explanation of the passage, and (4) a significant question about the topic which someone you know needs God’s answer for. (3 @ 40 points each, 120 points total)

**Assignment #3: Reading 10 Questions (Bibliology)** – Read *Basic Theology* (Section III, “The Bible: God-Breathed”) by Ryrie and Dr. Gromacki’s study notes on Bibliology then answer the 10 Questions assignment in Canvas about Bibliology. (100 points).

**Assignment #4: Exam #1 (Bibliology)** – Take the Bibliology Exam. There are 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice). Use the study guide to prepare for the exam. The exam is timed. (100 points).

**Assignment #5: Reading 10 Questions (Theology Proper)** – Read *Basic Theology* (Section II, “The Living and True God”) by Ryrie and Dr. Gromacki’s study notes on Theology Proper then answer the 10 Questions assignment in Canvas about Theology Proper. (100 points).

**Assignment #6: Research Essay** – Research a significant question in Bibliology, Theology Proper, OR Pneumatology, then write a 1500-word (5 pages for the body) Research Essay (i.e., include a title page, footnotes, and Bibliography) summarizing your biblical answer. The paper must follow the CU Style Guide Addendum to Turabian, include Scripture references (but not extensive quotations), and include at least 5 sources and

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footnotes. (Note: The questions to select from are listed in the assignment file in Canvas.) (200 points)

**Assignment #7: Exam #2 (Theology Proper)** – Take the Theology Proper Exam. There are 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice). Use the study guide to prepare for the exam. The exam is timed. (100 points).

**Assignment #8: Reading 10 Questions (Pneumatology)** – Read *Basic Theology* (Section XI, “The Holy Spirit”) by Ryrie and Dr. Gromacki’s study notes on Pneumatology then answer the 10 Questions assignment in Canvas about Pneumatology. (100 points).

**Assignment #9: Exam #3 (Pneumatology)** – Take the Pneumatology Exam. There are 50 questions (true/false and multiple choice). Use the study guide to prepare for the exam. The exam is timed. (100 points).
